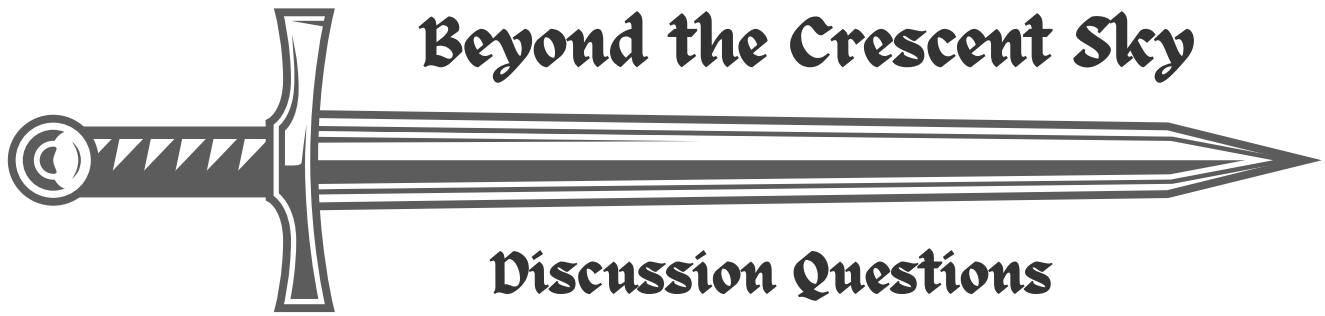

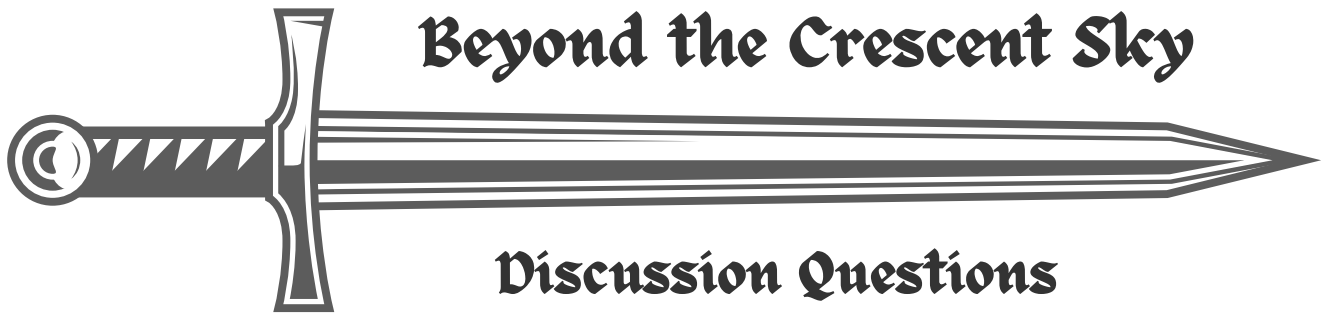

# Beyond the Crescent Sky

## Discussion Questions

1. For much of the story, the Serbs are vassals to the Ottoman Empire. Their duties include military service, financial tribute, and requests for hostages. Which element of vassalage would you most want to end were you in a similar situation?
2. Though they have much in common, the Serbs and the Greeks clash in a skirmish that harms both sides. Discuss the reasons both sides fight. Do you think Iskandar's lies would have been as effective on Konstantin and his men as they were on the Greeks? Why or why not?
3. How does the label of "enemy" affect how those in the kastron treat Ivan and how he sees them? Can you find examples in the news or in your community of instances where labels play a large role in how people are treated?
4. During the course of the book, Ivan's relationships with several Greek characters change. Discuss how and why his relationships with Helena, Matthias, Demetrios, and Gregoras shift over the course of the novel.
5. Discuss Helena's work as a midwife. Have you ever assisted anyone with a birth? Were there any times in the book that you disagreed with her medical choices? Times where you became more grateful for modern medical knowledge and procedures?
6. In *Beyond the Crescent Sky*, how do Ivan and Helena balance expectations, roles, and personal desires? In your own life, how do you balance expectations, roles, and personal desires?

## Discussion Questions

7. Helena tells Ivan: “God sees farther than we do. Perhaps, in time, you will see His purpose even in this.” Later in the book, Danilo gives Ivan nearly the same advice. Can you see this idea play out in *Beyond the Crescent Sky*? Have you found this to be true in your own life?

8. Discuss Ivan’s level of confidence as the book progresses. How does he feel about himself and his role at the beginning of the story? During his time in the Greek kastron? As he prepares for a military campaign as a župan? At the book’s ending?

9. Discuss Helena’s largest sacrifice for her people. What does it cost her? Would choice would you have made in her circumstances?

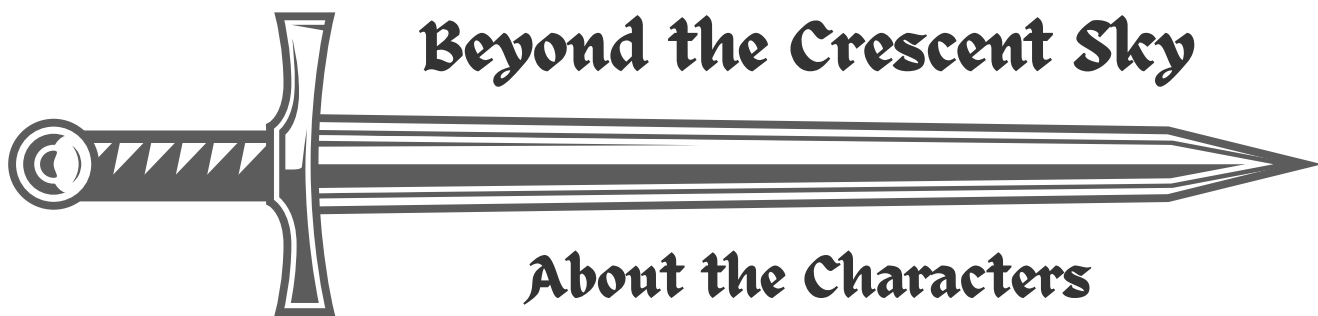
10. Discuss the relationship between Ivan and Konstantin, and then between Ivan and Danilo. What are they willing to sacrifice for each other? Did any of the advice Konstantin or Danilo give Ivan ring true to you? Examples might include:

From Konstantin: “The future is yours to create. You’ve never been ordinary, and now, my brother, it is time to be great. Take Fate and make it your servant.”

From Danilo: “Do not let this setback—no matter how devastating—become your Achilles’ heel. You’re stronger than that. . . . Be the leader I have always known you could become.”

11. Would you have shown mercy to Iskandar at the book’s end? Why or why not?

12. How will you try to take Fate, make it your servant, and create your own future?



## **Ivan**

Ivan Miroslavević is a Serbian noble. He is the second son of the late Župan of Rivak, and younger brother of the current župan. He is destined to inherit his maternal grandfather's lands in Sivi Gora, and since he was a boy, he has spent his summers in Sivi Gora and his winters in Rivak. His best friend is his cousin, Danilo. Ivan may be among the most stubborn people on earth, but he needed that stubbornness as a child to survive a series of illnesses and become a competent warrior despite his frequent health setbacks. He is deeply loyal to his people and their traditions, and he feels his duty to be a leader and a protector.

## **Helena**

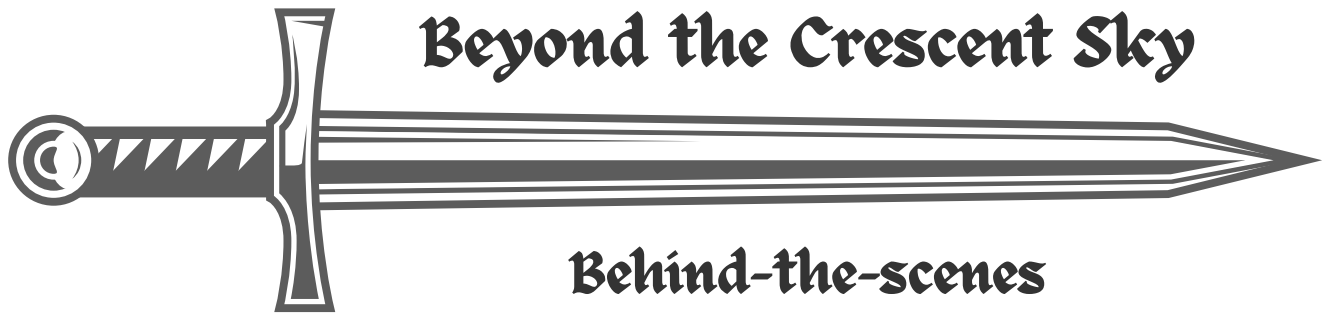
Helena is a Greek woman living in the kastron of a Byzantine pronoia. After losing her mother during the birth of a younger sibling, Helena sets a goal of becoming a midwife. Her studies are cut short when the midwife she apprentices under dies, but she continues to do the best she can for all who need her assistance. That includes, when needed, wounded warriors and wounded enemies captured in battle. She is a nurturer and a healer, and willing to sacrifice for others. She and her sister are orphans, and their family, though once noble, has fallen on hard times, but her sister is married to a member of the leading family in Byzia, giving her moderate status.

## Menu Suggestions

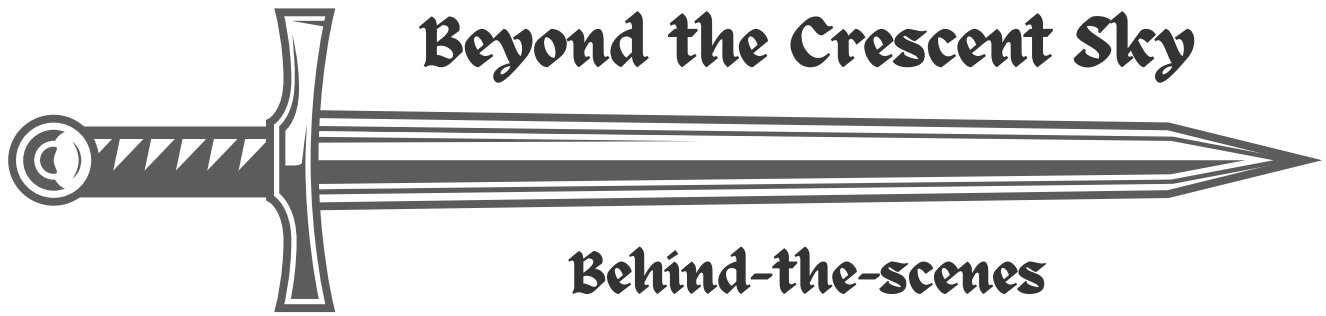
## Behind-the-scenes

When you look at the publication order, this is my fifth medieval story to be released. Yet it's the first one I wrote.

The idea for this book started when I was doing research in preparation for writing the book that would be called *Deadly Alliance*. That book was set partially in Yugoslavia. At the time, I didn't have a research budget for books, and I hadn't yet discovered inter-library loan. So I went to the local library and checked out everything they had on Yugoslav history. Even though I was looking for information on the Second World War, some of the history books covered huge swaths of time, including the medieval Serbian Empire, and I found that history fascinating. Definitely something that would make an interesting story, someday.

I continued to work on my first set of WWII books. Being a new author with a lot to learn, that first book faced many rejections. In 2009, assuming nothing would come from that first novel, I switched focus and started writing my first medieval book. Ivan and Helena had different names at that time, but Ivan was still incredibly stubborn, he still wanted to escape his captivity more than anything, and he still ultimately stayed because a kind healer made him promise he wouldn't leave. And the sultan still loomed in the background as one of the antagonists. I didn't finish my first draft of the book before my twins were born and that first WWII novel found a publishing home. Once again, I switched focus.

Five WWII novels and one WWI novel later, I was excited to dive back into that manuscript. I incorporated better history, cut or revised pieces of that early version, and completed a manuscript I was incredibly proud of with the hopes that it would be my 2018 release. Alas, the book was too long and the setting made it too much of

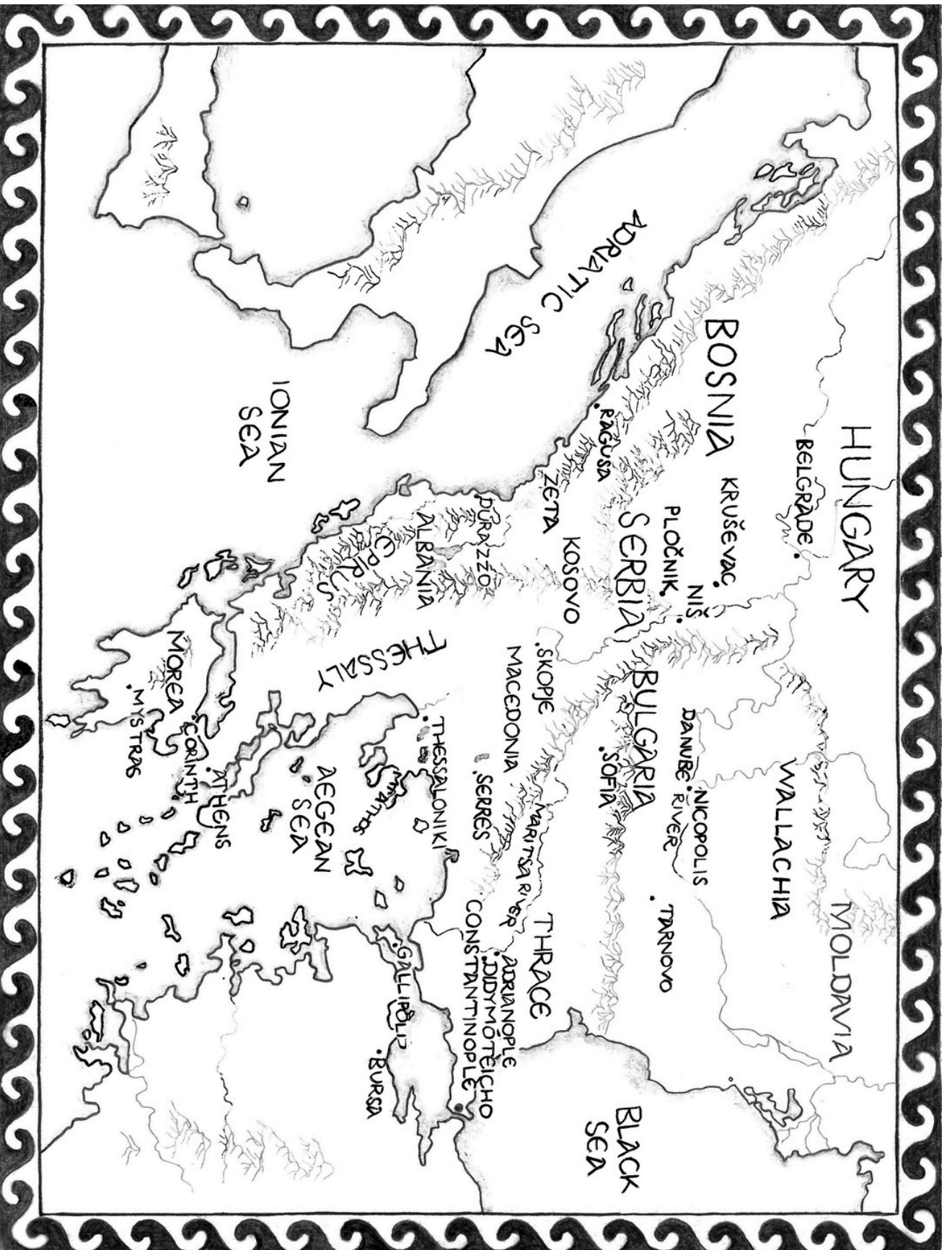


a marketing risk. Ivan and Helena's story (as well as an early draft of Danilo and Maja's story) once more were placed on hold.

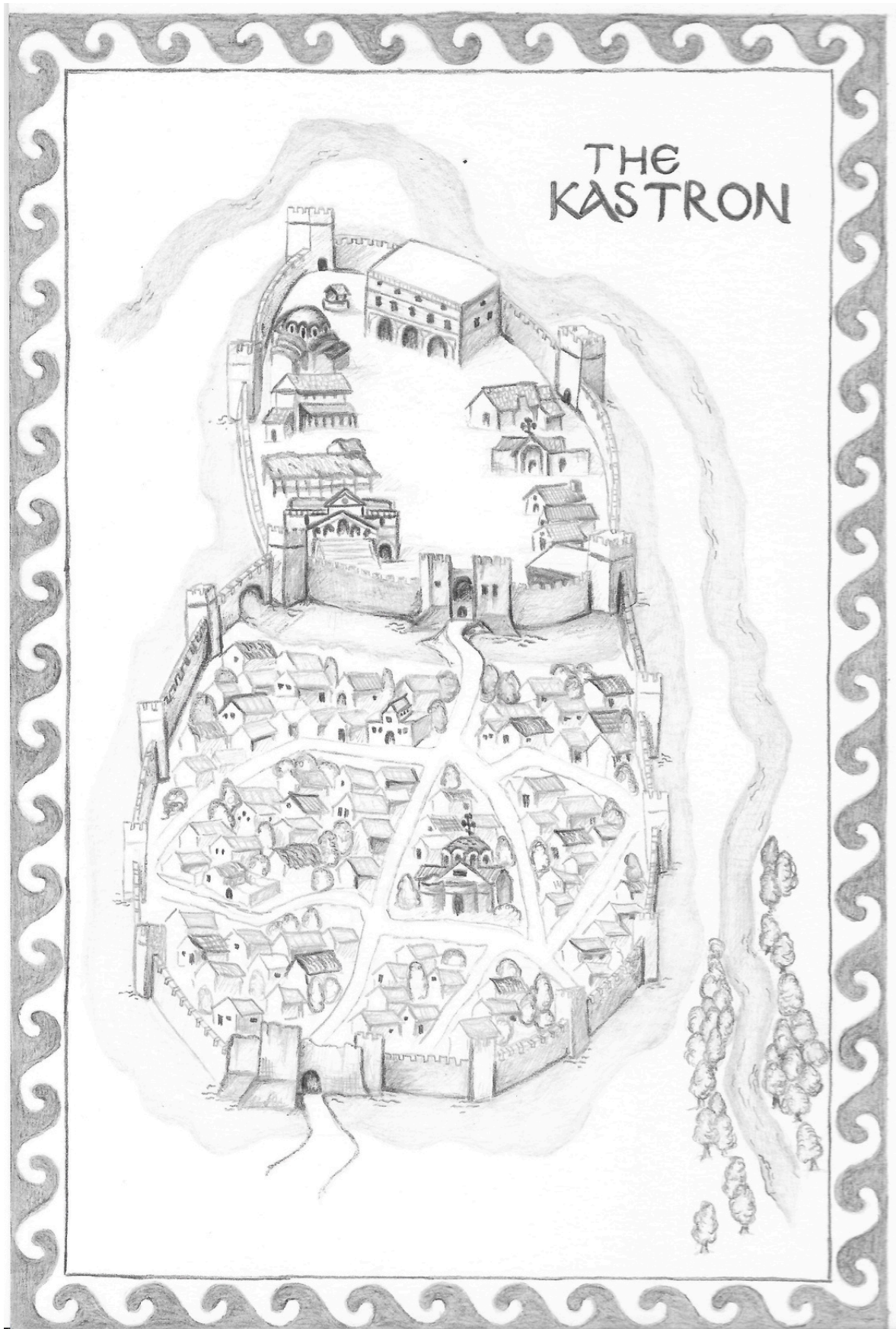
I loved those stories, so I decided I would publish them independently. Based on everything I had learned of Indie publishing, I thought it would be best to have at least three books to work with. I had wanted to write a story about Ivan's older brother anyway, so when I finally felt like I had caught up on my other projects and commitments, I wrote Konstantin and Suzana's story. It ended up being even longer than Ivan and Helena's story. Yet in those years of waiting, my publisher's business model and my track record had changed enough that my publisher was now interested in publishing all three. I emailed my editor Konstantin and Suzana's story, then Ivan and Helena's story both on the same day. (I don't expect that will ever happen again.) Later, we added a novella telling Miladin and Magdalena's story, and then I finished revisions for Danilo and Maja's story.

Ivan and Helena's story remains very special to me. During 2025, I had two books nominated for a Whitney Award, but according to the rules, I could only accept the nomination for one of the stories. There were many reasons to choose the other book, *Roads of Resistance*, but ultimately, I chose *Beyond the Crescent Sky*. I love Ingrid and Gerrit from *Roads of Resistance*, but I have loved Ivan and Helena longer. I hope that in reading *Beyond the Crescent Sky*, you have also grown to love them and their story.





Balkans Map by Heather Willis

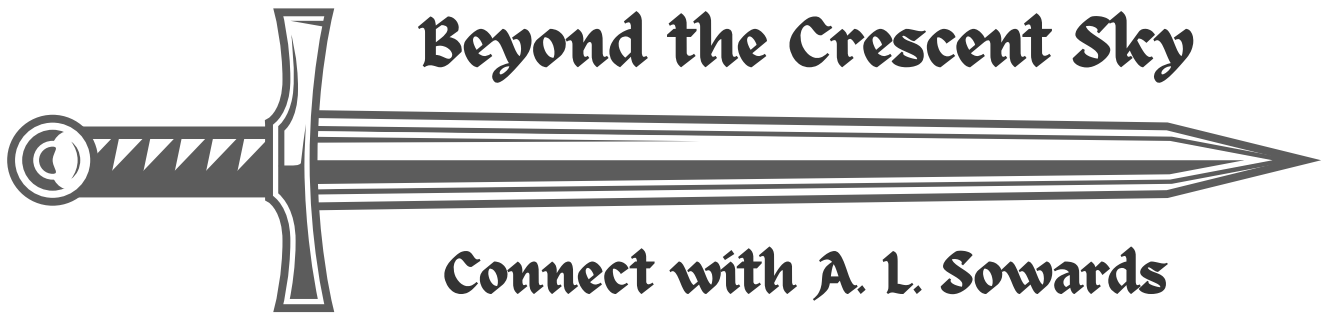


**Kastron Map by Heather Willis**

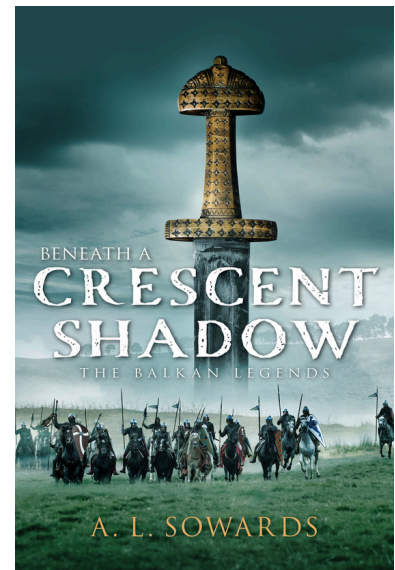
The Balkans, 1371

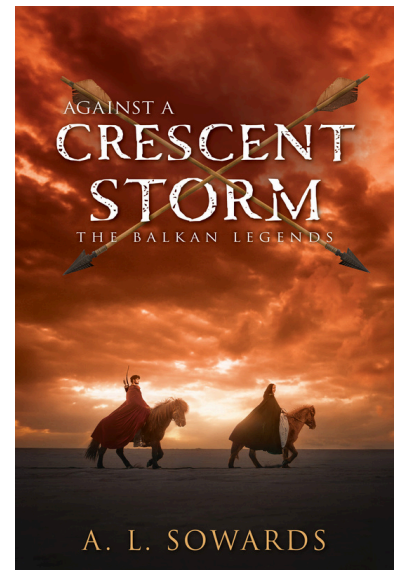
